

Since Camp Plymouth things have been busy around here, it's a nice change!



The next event in the queue for us is July 4th, and maybe a car show here and there along the way.


I hope you were able to attend a Memorial Day event as well, and paid your respects to the fallen.

While we're anxiously awaiting news of the State opening back up here's what we know is happening on the Peninsula and southward this July. Sometimes we forget what the 4th of July is and why we celebrate it. This is the founding of our country and is a dedication to all those who fought to create the greatest nation on Earth!

San Jose: This year's Rose, White and Blue Parade is begins at 10am, winding through the Rose Garden and ending on the grand avenue known as The Alameda. On The Alameda, you can enjoy a picnic featuring local food and drink, along with live music, an antique and classic car show, and dozens of arts and crafts booths. The fun continues with a fireworks display downtown starting at dark. It will have modifications based on current health regulations.

Santa Cruz: The only event in Santa Cruz this year is their annual Firecracker Race. It starts at 8 am and is a 5k.

Scotts Valley: Head over to Scotts Valley Drive for the annual parade at 3 p.m. and plane flyover.

Carmel-By-The-Sea: This year's celebration is a traditional, family-friendly event at Devendorf Park on Ocean Avenue across from Carmel Plaza. From noon to 3 p.m., enjoy entertainment and fun games for the entire family. They will also provide hot dogs, cold drinks, chips, ice cream, watermelon, and cookies. The festival and food are free, but get there early as quantities are limited.

Half Moon Bay: At 8 am, the Half Moon Bay Lions Club holds their 4th of July pancake breakfast in City Hall. The parade starts at noon and runs for about one hour.

Milpitas: The "Red, White & Boom" celebration in Milpitas is at the Milpitas Sports Center Complex (1325 E. Calaveras Blvd). This free afternoon event starts at 1 p.m. at the "Waving the Red, White & Blue" Pool Party. Continuing until 4 pm that afternoon. Food is also available for purchase. The "Red, White & Boom" Concert & Fireworks Show starts at 7 p.m. with the gates opening at 6 p.m. After the concert is the fireworks show.

Monterey: The celebration in Monterey starts with a pancake breakfast from 7 a.m. to 11 a.m. It's held at the Monterey County Youth Museum. The annual parade starts at 10 a.m. and lasts for about an hour. After the parade, head over to the Admission Free Big Little Backyard Bar-B-Que and Entertainment Extravaganza on the grounds of City Hall on Pacific Street. From 11 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., enjoy kids activities such as free carnival booths, games, face painting and jumpy houses. You will also find great food on sale all day long (or bring your own picnic lunch). The day wraps up with a free Patriotic Concert at the Golden Gate Theater. Doors open at 6 p.m. and the concert starts at 7 p.m.

Mountain View: The place to be in Mountain View on Thursday, the Fourth of July is the Shoreline Amphitheater. This annual concert by the SF Symphony with an amazing fireworks display is the perfect way to celebrate Independence Day. Doors open at 5 p.m. with games and events and then the music starts at 8 p.m. with the fireworks starting shortly after dark. The entire program lasts about two hours.

Redwood City: Redwood City will once again host the largest Fourth of July Parade in Northern California. It starts at 10 a.m. in downtown Redwood City on Broadway, Marshall, Main and other downtown streets. This year's festival takes place on the streets near the San Mateo County History Museum. You will find food, beverages, arts and crafts, and more. The Battle of the Bands competition starts at 1 pm on Hamilton Street. There is also a kids area and informational booths. The fireworks will start around 9:30 pm.

Los Gatos: The Los Gatos hometown Fourth of July event runs from 11 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at Oak Meadow Park, 233 Blossom Hill Road. The annual Flag Raising starts at 1 pm with music starting at 1:30 pm. This year's events include games, a picnic lunch, and music from the San Jose Wind Symphony.

Menlo Park: Their annual parade starts at 11:45 a.m. at Chestnut Street and Santa Cruz Avenue, and makes its way through the streets of Menlo Park to Burgess Park. At Burgess Park, the whole family can enjoy music, games, and food until around 2:30 p.m. The event is free, but a wristband is required for certain activities.

Pacifica: The annual celebration at Frontierland Park runs from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. with fun events such as live music, face painting, free games, food, crafts and more. Admission is free. **CONTINUED on PAGE 8**



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

Here's a story about Bubba... You know Bubba; he's the guy that makes oddball repairs and modifications to our military vehicles, notably jeeps but also most anything with wheels or tracks, where make-do is the name of the game. We have Bubba to thank for preserving many of our vehicles, saving them from the scrapper but at the same time making for some pretty awful situations to correct during a restoration. Things like removing 50 pounds of extra steel to get to the original frame horns (if they're still there) before installing new gussets and front bumper. I had to do that on one of my current projects, a late 1945 Willys MB I won at a UC Davis auction.

After I replaced the piece of steel channel welded to the frame horns with a reproduction front bumper and gussets, I decided to tackle the brakes. The jeep had functioning brakes for a little while when I first brought it home, but soon developed a leaking wheel cylinder at the right front. I had also noticed the wheel bearings were loose enough to allow the drum and hub to make a clunking noise when I pulled on the front wheels.

The outer portion of the locking hub came off without a problem, but after that things got wild. I'm not sure who worked on this jeep, but they clearly didn't have a maintenance manual and didn't pay attention to how things came apart. This is one for the books, worth sharing with my fellow military vehicle collectors:

First there was the castellated nut to remove from the axle shaft, so the inner portion of the locking hub could come off. The axle nut was held in place with part of a nail (instead of a cotter pin) that kept breaking off as I



tried to pull It out. Finally got it out using a pair of wire cutters to grip the last little bit of it while tapping the wire cutters with a hammer. Once I had the nail out, I had to use a pair of channel lock pliers to grip the nut and unthread it. It should have been easy with a 1-1/4" socket, but Bubba had ground off the points on the nut so the socket wouldn't grab it, and I didn't have a Bubba socket to fit.

Next were the wheel bearing nuts. Of course Bubba didn't own the correct wheel bearing nut socket so he used a hammer and chisel to install the nuts (seen that one before?), leaving

large divots in the nuts. I managed to hammer my wheel bearing nut socket in place and remove the outside locking nut which should have been held in place

by the lock washer bent to fit, but the washer wasn't bent. The washer slipped right off and the inside adjusting nut was loose (hence the clunking noise) so it came right off too.





When I pulled on the hub it came off easily without any brake shoe drag, but there was no washer between the adjusting nut and the outside wheel bearing. Hmm... should been a washer in there. The grease seal on the back of the hub was also missing, so the inside bearing stayed on the spindle. The bearings looked freshly greased and the brake shoes looked new, but the wheel cylinder looked old and corroded. And something else looked strange... the front brake is supposed to have a 1" cylinder (3/4" goes on the rear) and this one looked kinda small. Yup, it was a ¾" wheel cylinder on the front brake. I wonder if Bubba had trouble stopping this jeep? And this is just the first out of four hubs!


Between my parts stash and Ron Fitzpatrick Jeep Parts, I've gathered all the parts needed to put it back together correctly, including enough pieces for the other three wheels if they're anything like the first one. I haven't removed any of the other hubs yet but I'm assuming there are 1" wheel cylinders on the rear brakes and a ¾" cylinder on the other front brake, along with another nail for a cotter pin. But who knows what I'll find?

<u>Update:</u> Well, I figured out why Bubba ground the edges off the axle nut. Today I was reassembling the hub with the newly packed bearings, etc. When I got to the final step, bolting the outside flange of the Warn freewheeling hub in place, it wouldn't fit over the replaced (correct, unmodified) axle nut. A little research on the internet revealed that the nut is not used with the Warn hubs. Bubba apparently didn't know this either and proceeded to make it work by reducing the outside diameter of the nut. Turns out the nut is only used with the original axle flange, not with the aftermarket Warn freewheeling hub. So all I have to do is **not** install the nut – problem solved. Some of you probably already knew this, but in all my years as a jeep mechanic I have never installed new set of hubs, only replaced what was already there. In this case what was already there was incorrect.








REPORT FROM SPEARHEAD VI

(Part 4)

This is an after action report from the driver of Jeep 6. Part of the American Military Vehicle Squad "Spearhead VI". Over the next several months I will chronicle the adventures and experiences of Jeep 6, driven by myself, Scott Rohrs. I hope you enjoy these stories and maybe inspire or assist you in your own trip to the hallowed ground of the battlefields of Europe.

June 1st started early as we got up checked our Jeeps and choked down some bread, coffee and fruit. By this time I was over the cheese in the mornings. I could not resist the fresh croissants! The bread in France was truly excellent! We loaded up and headed to meet with the Norwegian group who where billeted in a 10th century farm just behind the German cemetery outside La Cambe. The scene is exactly how you would expect. The ancient French farm with stone square compound and beautiful green pastures surrounding the property. The walls of the compound even had slits in it to shoot arrows against invading forces. In the middle was a great line up of WWII jeeps ready for the day's dispatch. We did a meet and greet with the Norwegians and then headed out toward Carentan and a crossroads called "Dead Man's Corner".

The D-Day Experience Museum is located behind the house that was at the crossroads of the famed corner. This was an airborne museum with outstanding displays of field gear, an actual American wooden glider with a Jeep on board. The museum also had a cool feature by way of a C47 that visitors would load up in and it would simulate what the ride was like for the American paratroopers who flew in on the early morning of June 6th. When you looked out the windows you could see other planes on fire and paratroopers jumping out. The ride was complete with a crash landing in a field and smoke filled the cargo area as we were ushered out of the aircraft. An interesting note that the C47 simulator was the one that was used in the TV series Band of Brothers.

The original house on the corner is a museum also! Every room had mannequins and displays of how the German's were set up during the defense of that crossroad. The displays that I saw in France were world class! The equipment was all original field gear and uniforms and the mannequins are so life like. It was very impressive!

From the crossroads we headed a few miles up the road toward Utah Beach. We came to St. Marie du Mont. This was the first town Liberated by the famed 506th Parachute Regiment, Easy Company. We pulled the convoy into town and parked right in the church square in the middle of town. Remember; when you are rolling in a convoy of WWII vehicles you always get the preferred parking! The town was teaming with rigs, reenactors and tourist. The group split up a bit and we headed to Brercourt Manor. This was the farm where the famous first assault to take out the German artillery pieces by Easy Co. took place. There is a nice marble stone commemorating this action and a bronze relief map showing where the guns were placed and how the assault went down. Almost on queue, as we were reading the plaques and taking pictures, a flight of American Blackhawk and Chinook helicopters from the 101st Airborne flew over the site.

From that site we were headed for the beach. Utah Beach that is. We arrived just as the museum closed. The gift shop was open and all of the monuments outside were available to visit. You could see why this landing zone took fewer casualties than Omaha, due to the terrain and not as heavily defended. We of course had to get some sand on the tires. We were the only vehicles on the beach. It was awesome cruising up and down the shoreline. We stopped to get some really nice group photos of the troop.

Next stop was St. Mere-Englise, just inland from Utah Beach was the town. This was another strategic objective for the allies in their push inland from the coast. This is where the legend of the Paratrooper who spent D-Day hanging from one of the spires of the church in the middle of town. As we rolled into the square the first thing I saw was that trooper still hanging from that church spire. At least a mannequin with all of his jump gear was still hanging in the spot. The square was full of people. The town folks were mingling and drinking at the pubs with active duty members of the 101st AB and 82nd AB Division members. The active duty troopers were part of the demonstration drops that were going on throughout the days leading up to June 6th.

Memorial Day BBQ at Camp Lee






