Not much news to report on the vehicle front. With Camp Plymouth coming up, I'm turning the writing this month over to my wife to talk about some interesting places near our venue where you can drive and show off your vehicles. If you have questions about places in the area, feel free to message Nancy at 530-391-5650 or leave a note for Nancy or I at Cabin 10 Wed-Sat at the 49'er.

Of course, people love to see the vehicles at the Pokerville Market across the street from the 49'er. And, I know several of you have been seen at Marlene and Glen's Diner at the roundabout intersection of Hwy. 49 and Shenandoah Road. Here are a few other driving destinations to keep the fluids in your vehicle moving and so people can enjoy seeing our running history.

Thursday afternoon from 4 to 7 pm, there will be a Farmers Market on Main Street. It's at McGee Park on Main Street - between Hwy 49 and Empire St. Food, wine, fresh produce, baked goods, etc. will be available. It's a small-town country market.

We don't recommend drinking and driving but you may want to stop into Amador Brewing Company. Address is 9659 Main Street (at the Hwy 49/ Main Street roundabout take the direction that says Shenandoah Road). They're open for to-go purchases Monday - Thursday afternoons. On Friday, Saturday and Sunday, the taproom's open and a local caterer has food to eat onsite. Friday 1-8 pm, Saturday 11:30-7 pm, Sunday 11:30-6 pm. If no parking right at the brewery, there's a big lot across the street.

If you see a wine that's labeled "Shenandoah Valley", that means it's from the Plymouth region of Amador County. Did you know there are over 40 wineries throughout Amador

County, many winning gold and silver awards? Most wineries are open Thursday - Sunday afternoons. Some request that people call ahead if they want to eat at the wineries but all are very welcoming of those who want to stop in to enjoy the view and possibly taste. There are wine maps online and often in the office at the 49'er. We'll see if we can get some maps and have them on the porch of Cabin 10 from Wednesday afternoon onward.

Some wineries of note: Shenandoah - oldest winery in the county and a spot with amazing views. Karmere - wonderful views, sparkling wine as well as the standard wines, and some pretty fun plant sculptures. Helwig Winery - also great views; no concert that weekend in the ampitheatre. Driven Winery - a place we've visited on poker rallies and seen the old vehicles is now open for tasting only on Saturday and Sunday from 11 - 5. (How about a visit through the countryside to Driven on Saturday after the general meeting?)

Like bluegrass and other fiddle music? On Saturday, Sept. 17, the annual Fiddle Jam in Fiddletown will be the big happening in the area. You can enjoy the music from 11 am - 5 pm. The music is free. There will be beer, wine and country bbq as well as tours of the historic buildings there. The Celtic Candy store may be open for treats, too. Parking is limited. Their website suggests carpooling and says parking is about a block away. We've been to Fiddletown in past poker rallies - a quaint place with loads of history.

Amador City can be a fun place to wander around, look for antiques and have some lunch.

Volcano is a little farther out. This historic gold mining area is the home of Black Chasm Cavern and Chaw'se Indian Grinding Rock State Historic Park. If you didn't go to Black Chasm with us last year, you might want to take a drive and explore the area this year. Let us know about your sightseeing adventures in Amador County.

Hello North Bay West and beyond,

Greeting from the 6 Rivers National Forest. As I write this, I am assigned to the Lightning Complex out of Willow Creek, Ca.

Before I was "volun-told" to come up here, I was with member Ernie Ongaro and our Norwegian buddies attempting to tackle the Rubicon Trail with their modified M38's and a tribute MB. Let me back up, last year at this time, Ernie had told me about his Rubicon Trail trip he took with his newly trail modified M38. I was jazzed about the idea of taking a very lightly modified M38 across the trail. I told him to count me in for next years trip. Fast forward, Ernie had been prompting me about my progress on the Jeep. I had plans of swapping engine, lifting the jeep with shackles, and locking the front differential. Well as the date approached, I had none of that done! So.... I said well, I really want to do this and I defaulted to my 1977 CJ-7 to join the convoy with another vintage jeep. I loaded the jeep and took off from napa. Jeep ran great up to Truckee where Ernie has a vacation home. They had already been on the trail for two days vetting the jeeps for the true test! The jeeps did well and were ready for the next two-day adventure. I arrived in the evening and after "show and tell" and a few drinks we were in the sack and ready for the next day's adventure. 



My M38A1 by Mike Wenrich

Mariposa, California

Late in 2009 a friend called my attention to a note posted at the local (at that time) Mariposa NAPA store about a military Jeep for sale. That was likely because I have a modified 1956 Willys Wagon that is well known in my area. Not looking for another project as I have enough of those to this day, I looked at the note describing a 1961 M38A1. Mostly original. Since I belonged to the now defunct West Coast Willys Club at that time I thought there might be something here to preserve or at least offer to someone wanting to build a mountain crawler.

I contacted the seller. The Jeep was described as belonging to his late father and that his father had purchased it locally from a farmer about three years prior. It needed work (of course) but he said they had run the engine and that the brakes did not work. Got the address and saw it parked under a tarp. The story was that the farmer used it on his 40 acre ranch and it looked like it. The rear tub was sunken in from carrying loads, probably cement as I found dried mixed cement in the nooks and crannys. But it might have been protected in a building most of its life prior to the last three years. Badly faded but looked very complete and no rust.

I had no prior experience with a Military Jeep but have lots of hands on with older vehicles. As the vehicle was examined it became apparent to me that this was a very otherwise unmolested example. Data plates were present and it was still 24 volt. The only things missing were the canvas top, underhood shovel, fender axe, gas can, spare tire and two of the four side mounting hold downs for the top. One of those proved to be very difficult to locate. They are different from the 1950's A1s. The top bows were there along with original seats that had been recovered in the front. There was a CA 1973 yellow inspection sticker on the passenger front windshield to show when it was approved to drive on our highways and was likely the year of separation from the military.

Mind you, I was still not interested in taking on this project but it did peak my interest. I tried to find someone, anyone, who would take this project on. The more I looked at it the more I realized this was a unique vehicle that was 95% there. Finally I caved in and purchased it for myself and thus began a four year restoration. So what is so unique you might ask? I'm going to relate what I know, or what I think I know from questioning others in our organization. And what I discovered on my own along the way. I hope you find this as interesting as I did.

The data plate lists a March 1961 USMC contract order. From what I've heard that was the beginning of a new run of M31A1's. None made after 1958 or before 1961. March is possibly the very beginning. Everything outside on this one had been painted over OD Green before separation but everything under the hood and the undercarriage were still Marine Corp Green. A few chips of OD had come off the wheels showing yellow paint underneath. Figured that was just a repaint maybe by the farmer but later, upon dismounting the truck tires, I found the wheels had been expertly painted on both sides but the rim inside was still USMC Green. Even though I got the engine to run the carb overflowed and the engine was filthy in and out. At first I was just going to rebuild the carb and do the brakes then reassess. But somewhere I took a dark turn and decided to better clean this unit up. Might as well just pull the engine/trans and do an engine inspection.





All of the underwater fording equipment was still on the engine but the wiring in general was shot. I bit the bullet and bought a new harness, correct connectors and number tags. Got acquainted with many of our parts suppliers and of course the body work came last. Found a replacement rear floor pan and welded that in. The original was beyond reshaping. While cleaning the engine I found a rebuild data plate affixed to the lower crankcase on the driver side. It was from Fort Ord, August 1966. I'm told the Navy had an engine rebuild facility on the base. The engine serial number dates it to 1955 so it looks as though this was a replacement. BTW, I have a neighbor who was employed at Fort Ord as a civilian fireman but for the Navy as well. On an Army base. Confused yet?

The engine was in good condition so I had a shop do a valve job, hone the cylinders, deep clean the engine, etc. I did the assembly and painted the engine in the original color and acquired new decals for the finishing touch. New clutch and bearing and the trans/transfer case was in good condition. Then came the finish work. Sanded the hood expecting to find USMC and numbers down low but found US NAVY and 94-40137 further up the hood. Same thing on the rear bumpers. Nothing on the front bumper. Also found bondo on the rear body under the OD and USMC Green. This Jeep either backed into something or someone rear ended it. Otherwise no damage and no evidence of USMC use. NADA. One little scratch on the skid plate. That got me wanting to know more.



On the dash and under the OD was a vertical yellow sticker with Four Wheel Drive info . I had that replicated and have not seen another one on another military Jeep.

In the years since, I learned that motor pool vehicles, located on an air base, would fit this profile. Very fine sand was found on the undercarriage when dismantling and I believe the A1 was stationed somewhere in CA, possibly on one of the US Navy or USMC air bases. Another unusual item are the armrests on the passenger seat. Neither myself nor anyone else has seen those on a military OR the civilian CJ5. So one can imagine some base commandant requiring HIS vehicle to have arm rests.

Pictures of air base vehicles usually show either all yellow vehicles or a checkerboard pattern of black and yellow. Like a Follow Me vehicle would have. But others have surfaced that show the dark body with yellow wheels. Fellow MVCC member Jeff Intemann spotted one of those taken in Viet Nam with airmen sitting in the back.

So for those who have seen this vehicle at our meets, you know I wound up doing a complete restoration and tried to replicate what it would have looked like rolling off the assembly line, minus the graphics. To pay homage to our USMC and Navy vets I attached air base decals to the bumpers and a POW-MIA sticker to the side. A couple other added items were an overseas bumpers kit I found at Surplus City. This bumper moves the lifting shackles to the outside for lifting and tie down when shipped overseas. I like the finished look it gives to the back of the vehicle. At one of our gatherings I found a motor pool jumper cable with receptacle connection for the vacant port on the passenger side. I reasoned that a motor pool vehicle would have that to jump start other 24 volt equipment. Besides that, it explains to observers why the body indention is there.

With limited use over the years I found that the master cylinder fill cap with the air line open to atmosphere in the air filter canister is a

problem, caused my new cylinders to rust/lock up at a meet. Sent those and the master cylinder out to White Post Restoration to have them sleeved with metal (stainless I believe) that will not rust. There are still some mysteries this Jeep is holding back but I have found enough information to feel reasonably secure in what I am writing.

Anyone with with corrective or additional information is asked to enlighten me. The next owner should know as much as possible as well. I have thoughts about possibly donating this one day to an air base museum that might be interested in a unique but drivable display. For myself, I just cannot take this very capable off road vehicle up into my mountains and trash it.





Spirit of 45 in San Jose by Johnny Verissimo



Then Robert asked if there were any Rosie the Riveters in the crowd and I believe 3 stood up and again I was in awww. All 3 were introduced and the crowd applauded. The trip was worth is just to see members of that generation/era.

Displays. The location is considered to be a huge display in itself. There were also displays of 3 US Army tents complete with everything you could find inside them that you would have found in them back in the 1940's in theaters of war. Also found there was an awesome vintage looking tiki bar complete with bar tenders serving drinks.

The vehicles. There was a beautiful 1942 M3A1 Half Track, 1944 GPW and 1943 GMC CCKW 353 brought by MVCC member Tim Bowman of San Jose, a 1945GPW brought by MVCC member Ted Glogovac of San Jose, a ½ Dodge WC6 Command Car brought by MVCC member Phil Tracy, a 1941 Chevrolet ½ ton Stake Bed Truck brought by MVCC George Escobedo plus there were more military vehicles of which I didn't make it to take photos or meet them all.
